



Nursery have also been very excited about the five caterpillars we have been caring for as we watched them grow everyday - this exciting experience brings the children's learning to life as it allows children to observe them as they go through the different stages of becoming a butterfly. Additionally, we have also been learning about growing and what plants need to grow, the children had a go at filling their own plant pots with soil, water and cress seeds which they can watch grow in their own homes. 





Inspirational women week:


A beautiful assembly delivered by Umm Yusuf where we looked at inspirational women -in Islam -in society today - and in our school


Ustada Halima (Umm Sufyan) shared her journey in to Islam, the hardships she faced and how the strength of her eman helped her to overcome some of these challenges.
